







WHY VISA-FRFF AFRICA?

For the past 30 years, Africa has attempted to address free movement. A continental strategy document was signed but the very little result can't be enjoyed. There are hundreds of untold stories of African students, entrepreneurs, professional and traders, who could not travel to a conference, internship, business meeting or even better career prospects because they could not meet the visa requirements.

The purpose of this campaign is a call to our leaders to fast-track this process with:

- 1. A clear plan with clear deadlines to when we will have a #VisaFreeAfrica
- 2. All African countries to grant to Africans at least a 30-day visa on arrival



BACKGROUND

The #VisaFreeAfrica campaign, an initiative of the Kigali Global Shapers, was launched in Kigali, on the sidelines of the 2016 World Economic Forum for Africa. In 2017, National Aviation Services became a partner and exclusive sponsor to the initiative.

The #VisaFreeAfrica campaigns includes a global petition that calls for all 55 African countries to grant a 30-day visa upon arrival to all African citizens by 2022 and achieve free movement of people across all African countries by 2030.

The campaigns calls for citizens all across the african continent to engage their leaders and policy makers in dialogue about the need to ease mobility on the continent. Will you join us on this journey.
